Affordable housing planned in north Tempe

Tempe continues to lead the way in addressing affordable housing needs with plans for a new development in north Tempe through \$10.8 million in funding from Maricopa County. Mayor Corey Woods and Maricopa County Board of Supervisors Vice Chairman Jack Sellers, along with other community leaders, worked together to fund more affordable housing in Tempe.

The city envisions a high-density, mixed-income and mixed-use urban development that could spark additional housing opportunities. The city is currently exploring properties; no location has been selected. Preliminary plans call for approximately 50 affordable housing units, available to households earning at or below 80% of the Area Median Income. Amenities will promote a healthy, supportive. community-focused lifestyle with a grocery store, Tempe police substation and more.

Tempe's wide-ranging affordable housing efforts are driven by the city's Hometown for All initiative, which creates sustainable funding to expand housing opportunities. Learn more at tempe.gov/HometownforAll.



Homelessness drops by more than 30%

The number of unsheltered people in Tempe has dropped by more than 30%, results supported by the city's investment in enhanced homeless solutions. The last two Point-in-Time homeless counts have shown a 30% decrease during an 11-month period, from 515 in August 2022 to 355 in June 2023. Using another regional data point, Tempe has seen a 32% decrease in the number of unsheltered people being served in the city.

Tempe has invested \$4.9 million in this top priority this fiscal year. These investments have resulted in nearly 16,000 engagements with unsheltered people and a positive housing resolution for more than 1,200 people in the last 20 months. Track the city's progress at tempe.gov/HomelessResponse.

More input, research sought for potential ADU expansion

Tempe will continue exploring options and seeking public feedback about the expanded use of accessory dwelling units (ADUs), as directed by the City Council.

An ADU is an independent, smaller, rentable dwelling unit located on the same lot as an existing, standalone single-family home. The use of ADUs could increase affordable housing, create housing diversity, provide opportunities for multi-generational living and generate income for homeowners. Tempe commits to building green facilities, encourages developers to follow

Construction of city facilities is doubling down on going green, and local developers have the option to do the same. Late last year, the Tempe City Council adopted a resolution that commits future city facility construction to sustainable building practices and establishes a voluntary sustainable building code for local development. Tempe will use the International Green Construction Code (IgCC), a building code used to guide sustainable, resilient and high-performing development while prioritizing nature and climate.

Green codes like IgCC reduce Green House Gas emissions, mitigate heat island effects, reduce water consumption, decrease dependency on fossil fuels, increase building life spans and heat resiliency while promoting native, desert-adaptive landscaping and structural shade. Do your part to help keep your alleys clean

Tempe City Code requires residents to maintain their alleys from the end of their property line to the center of the alleyway to help reduce fire hazards, limit the spread of pests, decrease criminal activity and make way for first responders and city vehicles. Alley inspections take place regularly.

- Keep the alley clear of trash, debris and unnecessary items
- Place bulk trash items or landscape waste out no earlier than 10 days in advance of scheduled pick up
- Remove vegetation and other obstructions

New art adds vibrancy to underpass

Traveling Mill Avenue just north of Broadway Road is about to get a lot more vibrant with the addition of new art to the existing underpass. This regionally distinct project will capture the attention of motorists and pedestrians coming and going from the areas around downtown Tempe and ASU. Arizona-based artist Joseph O'Connell of Creative Machines was selected to design the piece. The artist's concept involves a series of nature-inspired sculptures that stretch upward along the terraced walls of the underpass and will project colored shadows along adjacent surfaces. Tempe amends Fair Housing Code

Tempe's City Code includes new protections for those seeking housing, making it illegal to discriminate against someone based on their source of income such as a Housing Choice Voucher. The Tempe City Council late last year unanimously approved changes to the city's Code. The source of income proposal came through the city's Workforce Readiness and Livable Communities Council Committee, which includes Councilmembers Berdetta Hodge and Randy Keating. 
