

More affordable housing, new homeless shelter

Recent City Council action expands affordable housing and amenities in the Apache Corridor and creates a new shelter option for those experiencing homelessness. Both projects are designed to meet broad community needs.

LaVictoria Commons

New affordable apartments, and townhomes for purchase. A community-centered health clinic. Neighborhood gathering spaces. A busy hub that encourages light rail.

LaVictoria Commons is expected to transform vacant cityowned property into a dynamic new housing development with benefits for both the surrounding neighborhood and entire city. The development will bring nearly 125 new affordable rental and homeownership opportunities to the property near Apache Boulevard and the Price 101 Freeway. The development is coming to fruition as a result of the city's innovative Hometown for All initiative, designed to expand affordable housing opportunities in Tempe. New shelter option

More people experiencing homelessness in Tempe will be able to access shelter at a motel purchased by the city, accelerating the pace in which individuals and families are helped off the streets and into more permanent housing solutions.

The 58-room Apache Inn. near Apache Boulevard and McClintock Drive, is expected to begin serving clients in early 2025. The purchase totaled nearly \$10.7 million, with \$7.3 million in Maricopa County funds and the remainder from the city. The city's portion includes \$500,000 in federal funds allocated to Tempe through Congressman Greg Stanton. Read more at tempe.gov/EndingHomelessness.

- Benedict Sports Complex: 490 W. Guadalupe Road (northwest corner of Guadalupe and Kyrene roads, east side of parking lot). Open daily, 24 hours

Be stormwater smart!

Tempe is urging residents to help protect our stormwater system – and the environment – by avoiding use of pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers and other outdoor chemical products when rain is likely. When it rains, excess water can flow off lawns and driveways, creating the potential to pollute Tempe's lakes and drinking water aquifers. Making sure that

only rain goes in the storm drains ensures that our water supply remains clean and safe. Additionally, consider the benefits of adding flood insurance. For tips and more information, visit **tempe.gov/stormwater**.

Keep your pets safe!

Storms can be scary, especially for your furry friends.

- Make sure your pets are safely inside before thunder, lightning or rain hit this can prevent pets from running off or getting sick.
- Be sure your pet is microchipped or wearing a collar in case your pet does escape – this can increase chances of being reunited.
- Pick up pet poop before a storm hits pet waste is full
 of bacteria and pathogens, if it gets into storm drains it
 could pollute our water supply.

Don't let Stinknet stink up your yard

Stinknet, or Globe Chamomile, is a highly invasive weed spreading rapidly in central Arizona. It is a short-lived annual plant with a very displeasing odor that grows from December through the spring. If you see this plant growing in your landscape, the best approach is to remove it and throw it away, being careful not to spread the seeds. Be sure to wear gloves and long sleeves, as it can be an allergen, and remove the plant before it flowers.

Be mindful - Never leave kids or pets in the car for any period of time and check in on older neighbors frequently. Get more tips at **tempe.gov/SafeSummer**.

It is important to learn the distinction between the two so you can be prepared to take action! Each year, Tempe produces a Consumer Confidence and Water Quality Report, sharing important information about the quality of potable (drinking) water provided by the City of Tempe. This report contains information on Tempe's water sources and results from required water quality tests compared to the standards set by the United States Environmental Protection Agency under the Safe Drinking Water Act. The report highlights Tempe's efforts to provide reliable, high-quality water, wastewater and stormwater services, which support Tempe's public health, quality of life and economic vitality.
