Public meetings for bond election

Registered Tempe voters will have the opportunity to decide whether to fund public safety and road improvements, quality-of-life enhancements in Tempe neighborhoods and new affordable housing. Voting takes place in conjunction with the Nov. 5 Statewide General Election.

Included in the bond is funding to restore the pavement of every street in Tempe within five years, provide funds for critical infrastructure projects like water lines, improve neighborhood parks and increase the supply of affordable housing. Tempe programs move resident from homeless to housed

It's 9 a.m. on a recent Saturday and another typical day comes to life outside Tempe's shelter for people who are homeless. Inside room #117, a new life is taking shape. Keith Holmes is packed up and ready to move into his new, permanent home.

The shelter offered a safe haven where Keith could make plans for the future, the city's Tempe Works program connected him to a job and steady paycheck and city staff assisted him with his housing voucher to offset rent. All of these city supports helped Keith move from homeless to housed – one of about 1,675 people helped into a housing resolution

in the past two years through city investments.

Assistance programs available for free home upgrades

Home modifications can prevent falls and fires, keep utilities running smoothly and make your home more comfortable. These updates can be out of reach financially for some, but these programs provide financial assistance.

- Through their Safe at Home program, Rebuilding Together Valley of the Sun provides home safety
 modifications like grab bars, toilet risers and rails and threshold ramps. See the income qualifications

- The U.S. Department of Energy's Weatherization Assistance Program helps low-income households with repair or replacement of air conditioners and water heaters, installation of insulation and much more. Get details at fsl.org/weatherization.



Monsoon season reminders

It's time to prepare and stay weather aware. When's the last time you stashed some emergency items for later use? Consider keeping extra water, flashlights and batteries, nonperishable food and other handy items around in the event of flood or power outage. Get free sand and bags 24/7 through Sept. 30 at following locations:

- 1001 N. Rio Road: (access drive north of Rio Salado Parkway and Hardy Drive)
- Benedict Sports Complex: 490 W. Guadalupe Road (northwest corner of Guadalupe and Kyrene roads, east side of parking lot)

Stay safe in summer heat

If you must be out during the hottest time of the day, be alert for signs of heat illness. Symptoms include feeling hot, weak, dizzy or faint, cramping/muscle spasms, nausea, or rapid pulse. Protect yourself by limiting physical activities, drinking plenty of water and wearing light loose-fitting clothing. Call 911 or seek medical attention if you or someone you know develops heat illness. Avoid getting overheated. Cooling centers are open until Sept. 30.

Can you help others in need? Donate bottled water to support our HOPE homeless outreach team and CARE 7 crisis team. Handing out water helps people stay hydrated and also opens the door to conversations about shelter and resources. City contractors around your neighborhood

Tempe is working on a water service line inventory project that includes inspections of service lines near water meters. The inspections are quick, performed outside and involve visual verification of service line material near the water meter and the hose bib where water enters the home. The city will need access to your hose bib and water meter to perform the inspection. Results of the inspection will be delivered on a doorhanger—no action is needed from Tempe water customers; however, contractors may request some residents relocate vehicles. 

alongside the honor of being ranked as the #1 Elementary School District in 2024 by the opinion poll, Ranking Arizona. Tempe School District No. 3 became the third school district in Maricopa County officially in 1874, with earlier accounts referencing children attending a two-story school on Eighth Street in the vicinity of McAllister Avenue. Today, led by Superintendent Dr. James Driscoll, Tempe Elementary Schools has a student population of approximately 10,000 students. School started July 24 but the district continues to enroll students in preschool through eighth grade for the 2024-2025 school year.
