


## Rio Salado and Beach Park Masterplan Survey Summary May 9, 2018 – May 18, 2018

### <u>OVERVIEW</u>


A stakeholder and a public meeting were held on May 9, 2018 to get feedback on the conceptual draft plan for the Rio Salado and Beach Park Masterplan. The invitation to attend the public meeting was distributed citywide. Twenty-nine people attended the stakeholder's meeting and eighty-five attended the public meeting. Surveys were available at both meetings and online on Tempe Forum from May 9 through May 23, 2018. A total of 115 survey responses were received; 10 at the meeting and 95 online.

#### SURVEY RESPONSES

#### 1. Please provide comments on the Conceptual Draft Masterplan.

- Need to include more shade structures with solar panels. Please do not build stages and docks into the lake because they would be hazards to rowers, scullers. Proposed pedestrian, biking bridge at east end is crucial link to bike trails leading east-west and north-south. The city should not wait 3 or 4 more years for federal funding. Make funding that bridge a quid pro quo for developers who want to build on southside. Need more bathrooms around/near the lake.
- Great start. Glad there's a long-term plan. Focus on access via transportation. Integrate large project to pedestrian uses. Build another route across water. Like water taxi idea. Find area that supports water activities.
- 3. Residents of Hayden Ferry Lakeside condos have no place to store a boat.
- 4. Nice work! Very comprehensive and thorough. Great graphics and nice, very poised presentation. Thank you. While I appreciate the desire and need to bubble it out into zones, that feels a bit like an old school zoning map versus a more contemporary mixed-use approach. Same for the activities, they feel a little like plop art. Who's to say that art of a children's pond shouldn't be in the eco zone. Or, volleyball courts in the marina zone? Or to mix or overlap.
- 5. It seems pretty inclusive and shows a lot of thought has been put into it. Thank you.
- 6. I use the park weekly for bicycling and kayaking. The plan is very exciting. I'm all for it.
- 7. I like it and believe that it will get busier and used more, especially when more shade is in place. Love the idea of a water taxi!
- 8. Love the Riparian Habitats and ideas to conserve them as wild, uninterrupted areas that preserve the many species that migrate there. This is an amazing asset for migratory birds, costs nothing to maintain, and provides tourism dollars to local businesses, peace and beauty options for Tempe Residents and nature/Conservation opportunities for everyone. Please put the tic tac buoys BACK on the east end so boaters don't disturb large numbers of ruddy ducks who rest there along with buffleheads, canvasbacks, cinnamon teals, green-winged teals, and so, so, so much more. And thank you for your hard work!
- 9. I can't seem to find any wording on the masterplan, what's changing, etc. but wondering if any parking will be added?
- 10. I really like the boardwalk concept around parts of the lake. I would also like to see a designated beach area that goes along with the swimming area that is show on the north side of the lake. I would hope to see a continued emphasis on connectivity with areas around the lake/park such as Tempe Marketplace, The Grand at Papago Park Center, the future Watermark development, and the future Novus Innovation Corridor (from my understand they have plans to create a multi-use path along Rural Rd that would connect with the lake--I really hope this comes to fruition).
- 11. Stop over developing this area.

- 12. Some interesting ideas though it doesn't address my main issue with the current park use, that of large events in Tempe Beach Park that end up closing off the path around the lake and the few areas of grass and restrooms available. I would prefer a venue for this be moved to the West of the TCA. Do drunk revelers really care if they are near the water??? Not to mention these events cater to more people from outside Tempe than in. I understand the revenue model for this but I stopped using this area several years back due to the overwhelming number and size of events and no information online about how they impact access to the park or nearby area.
- 13. Looking forward on the progress to enhance Tempe Town Lake! Definitely a step up to bring in new revenue!
- 14. As a biologist and birder, I really like the inclusion of bird watching and the riparian area! I also like the pocket park idea. Could there be more features on the eastern end of the plan as well. I also like the idea of art and sculpture gardens and nodes. Or a sound garden. More shady gazebos or vined trellis structures. What about a rock wall like at Millennium Park in Chicago?
- 15. Would love to have tennis courts
- 16. Not bad. Need to make sure there's more shade.
- 17. Like the Riparian Areas on each end. One with entry and interpretive trails or paths. More Access from neighborhoods nearby, More consensus from residents living nearby. Public Park Not Theme Park. Recreation has to include Swimming Areas. Please allow entry to area below dam for Nature Walks
- 18. I've responded with a few suggestions once before. I think a simple fitness/exercise course would be great. Kind of a circuit training with pull up bar, step ups, push up bar, etc. I've seen them in other public parks. Thank you.
- 19. Looks great. I like that my idea of a bike overpass on the east end made its way through TBAG to the plan. I help organize a group of circus artists (Sunday Tempe Flow Jam group on Facebook) that use Tempe "Beach" Park every Sunday to practice and share our skills, including juggling and slackline. It seems there will be more small spaces for similar activities, which is great. Has anyone suggested an island with trees and access by boat and stairs down from the Rural Rd overpass? It would make a great nook for those seeking quiet. Bike access to the north and south shore trails could be improved at Mill Ave on the north side, and Rural, both sides and both North and South side; though Rural is far better at present than Mill. Need to add proper campgrounds between the 202 and Curry, Mill and College, along with naturalizing the canals in that area for swimming and fishing under the native trees. It could be so nice, rather than struggling with "cleaning the trash" "left" by homeless encampments. I for one would like a place in town where I could bike to and camp with my son on a weekend.
- 20.Overall, I like the conversion of vacant areas on north side into sports activities such as BMX or rock climbing instead of more condo. There is good separation from parks, swim areas, boating, events, and board walk to accommodate many and yet not in the same area. There is a lot to offer for families, single adults, or retirees including TCA on south side for culture influence.

- 21. I am very pleased to see a swimming area included! The plan looks great, better than I could have imagined.
- 22. The link gives us 5 images, with no textual explanation. I cannot comment with any confidence on images alone, without a discussion of what they mean.
- 23. The plan looks good but I'd like to see another pedestrian bridge on the East end. This bridge would connect the South path to the green belt path
- 24. I've noticed at Kiwanis Park that the multi-use areas for fishing and public ramadas can get really dirty, pretty gross, with fish blood and guts. It's disappointing that some fisherman are not the best stewards, but I wonder if a few cleaning stations might be considered to encourage disposal and appropriate clean up? Also, if you are encouraging fishing and birding, you might want to encourage and provide opportunities for proper disposal of fishing line as it can be very dangerous for wildlife. I'd like to see information on how to be good park stewards and how our trash and actions impact wildlife at the park in our new interpretive areas.
- 25. Overall the plan looks good. I don't quite understand the boardwalk concept. I think having concrete here in the heat of AZ works best. Maybe the concrete could be made to look like wood as they've done at Mesa Riverview. I really like the idea of developing the park at the west end.
- 26. It looks pretty good! Please plant as many trees as you can, along Tempe Town Lake: Fremont cottonwoods, Goodding willows, velvet mesquite, netleafhackberry, velvet ash, Mexican elderberry....We need the shade and the beauty of the trees!
- 27. The Conceptual Draft Masterplan is hard to read because it does not include street names. It looks as though the baseball field at TBP is being eliminated. It would be a shame to lose this baseball field; my son has had games at the baseball field (I wish he played more games there), and it was a fun way to spend time at TBP. I'd also like to see a play area for kids that is integrated into the natural environment -- something similar to the play area at the Gilbert Riparian Preserve would be a wonderful addition. Right now, TBP and the surrounding area is not particularly kid friendly. A play area with a water feature would be ideal -- check out the kids' area at the Denver Botanical Garden: https://www.botanicgardens.org/york-street/mordecai-childrens-garden
- 28. Two areas concern me. First is the climbing wall under the 202. Seeing it as it is now, I rarely see anyone when I pass through there, so I worry about liability especially with children. Second it stinks even when dry and when it rains it is a mess for a sometime. Second is the swimming areas. Is that a pool? Hopefully not the lake itself! Either way you need some oversight. Do we have patrols on the lake now?
- 29.1 like the inclusion of the riparian areas, would like more foot access to the areas with paths, not just viewing platforms. Please don't try and compete with Mill Ave, leave the restaurants on Mill Ave. Vending carts selling hot dogs and ice cream would be okay. And forget the water taxi concept, this is not the San Antonio river walk nor do I want it to become like that. Besides the boats would have to be motorized, fouling the water with their exhaust and fuel and oil spillage.

- 30.In principle looks interesting but more information is needed to make comments. Hopefully that information will be available in the near future. For instance, is there going to be water in the rest of the canal? If not, it would be nice to plant fruit trees and have places for family picnics, etc.
- 31. A splash pad would be a nice addition for kids. Additionally, whenever there is an event, you shut down the boardwalk and for those that are commuting work on bike, it takes 10 extra minutes to go around. Please give people the option to be escorted to the other side so that they can use public space for their bikes.
- 32. Rock climbing wall and other activity centers are a great idea! Programming needs to come with these amenities though. Will it be City led or private companies? Why new volleyball courts proposed? The new ones aren't used very often. I don't see much focus on connecting to Papago Park. This is a fantastic regional resource. It would be great to have connections to Papago Park. There are also paths that should be connected to - the Grand Canal and the Crosscut should be connected to. The more connections we can bring to Papago and the other resources north, the greater the access and less parking that will be needed. I didn't see anything about using street car to transport attendees to events at TBP. Perhaps a park and ride or some sort of staging area would be a good idea? There are a lot of residential proposed on the north side of Town lake near Scottsdale Road, but the connection to the south is not very good for pedestrians or bikes. Can we make a better connection that using the utilitarian Scottsdale Road Bridge? I've seen wakeboarding competitions at the Lake in the past. Why not allow people to do this at all times? The swimming area is a neat idea. Why is it just confined to one location? Water quality? Riviera south NEEDS a connection to the south for bicyclists that will use the new bridge. Please plan for this. McClintock is not a very good north-south road for bicycling and the bridge will connection Scottsdale-Tempe-Mesa - please provide good access to this regional connection. Why are we not encouraging to have restaurants along the lake? This would be a beautiful setting for a nice restaurant.
- 33. Love it that there is a swimming area, very much needed.
- 34. The inexperienced but intelligent user on this site just gets the run around. Is it not possible to make the plan readily available? If so, do it. Thanks.
- 35. I am looking for a safe pathway to Tempe Market Place.
- 36. A few aspects, like the bird observatory and the pedestrian bridge, will be terrific. But these docks are a disaster for anyone who uses the lake for rowing, dragon boat racing, or sailing. The lake looks crowded with docks and floating stages -- this is awful. Is the idea to kill any serious use of the lake by watercraft?
- 37. Because of the tall buildings around the lake, you have ruined a great beginners' lake for sailing. I think it is disingenuous for you to solicit private funds to build something then expect them to turn it over "for the common good" see plan for boat house!
- 38. Love the planned additional pedestrian bridges. This will tie Tempe to Mesa and provide continuity needed on bike path.
- 39. Looks good

- 40.Some nice aspects, seems like the uses may be a little too spread out to create a cohesive, active, and utilized park. Can there be a stronger link to Papago park? How about locating the riparian habitat next to the existing habitat area at Papago park? Pool seems isolated, and is it a good idea to place a public pool right next to a bird habitat ;) Skatepark would be cool between the two bridges like Burnside in Portland. Overall, the lake is challenge given the lack of density, walkable streets and unfortunate surrounding developments there's no boardwalk with shops and restaurants. Everything is too spread out from an urban planning / walkability perspective. The only reason to walk the lake is for recreation. Additionally, it's lacks nature I was recently in Denver at their riverfront park and everyone migrates to the banks to hang out beneath the trees, to hear the running water, their dogs splash in the water - it's a great piece of nature - why not plant as many trees as possible along the banks create shade, nature and respite from our citizens - we can only hope they'll grow enough to cover up the glare from the glass boxes. Why so much turf, can we try not to waste so much water with the falling water level of Lake Mead? What's the future of the lake if we start having water shortages? Bring back the river, birds, and wildlife. Push back on APS, Flood Control, FAA. Think big, great cities are known for their great parks, and this could define Tempe, it could make people want to live here, it could connect us to Papago Park and Indian Bend Wash. There should be more reasons to go to the park - places to eat and drink, games, hammocks, firepits, barbeques, climbing hills, permanent sculpture, interactive art, placemaking, selfie ops, etc.
- 41. You need a real playground for kids! Not just a slash pad area! Please put in a playground!
- 42.Glad to see the city spending some effort to think ahead about the future of Town Lake and area.
- 43. Provide shade structures!
- 44.Until it can be affordable and the "lake" can be detoxified (currently nothing more than a settling pool for toxic refuse and garbage) I believe it should be a non-starter. As it only truly benefits ASU let the university pay for it out of their budget. This is a desert and the waste of water there is an affront and only a "feather in the cap: of political hacks needing validation..


- 46.Looks great but want to make sure the trails remain open for hiking and mtn biking.
- 47. Love the skate park and BMX idea as well as the new beach access. I think it's a great idea to attract more people closer to the lake even just to hang out. Better utilizes the space. The new parking garage is nice but since it's on the north end how would people be able to go between both sides? I'd want to make sure the boat rentals is still available since my family loves doing that in the good weather. I'm sure this will be part of it but I think lighting is VERY important to make sure everyone is safe at night especially in the underpass areas and more isolated parts of the lake if we're trying to bring more people into that north side. Addressing the homeless population will be needed because there are many who rely on the whole Tempe town lake area as shelter.

- 48.1'd like to submit a few comments on the Tempe Beach Park plan and Tempe Town Lake in general. My wife and I are Tempe resident and members of the Arizona Dragon Boat Association\* who spend three to four days a week on the lake. Even though I have questions about funding and maintenance of the overall Tempe Beach Park Master Plan, I do support development along the Rio Salado downstream from the west dam. It promises a new dimension for use and visual relief that would be a nice extension to the lake. Demand for week day and weekend water time by paddlers, rowers, sailing clubs, outriggers, SUP's and dragon boaters has put a great deal of pressure on both lake access and parking. Since we use the lake frequently I am already overwhelmed with the shortage or parking and clumsy access. Yet, the proposal shows the loss of some parking east of the marina. Tempe is encouraging more bicycle use, but when setting off from a work place, carrying gear and equipment, or hauling boats to the lake, simply leaves bicycles out of the question. Parking is already so congested that many are forced to use no parking zones or unsafe places. Additional parking space is much more demand than other parts of the plan. Finally, the idea of a motorized lake taxi or ferry conflicts with the growing use by non-motorized craft of many types. For example, recently there were 10 rowing shells lined up side by side along with two dragon boats all trying to practice without causing interference with each other. Mixing a motorized taxi into the traffic is a very poor idea. Thank you for the opportunity to express these thoughts. \*AZDBA: A nonprofit organization with approximately 350 members. Our beneficiary is Arizona Disabled Sports. Other local divisions include youth paddlers ages 8 to 14, an ASU team and a Breast Cancer Survivors team. Each team has at least 22 paddlers. AZDBA holds an annual Dragon Boat Festival drawing approximately 900 visitors to Tempe for the two-day event.
- 49.The information signs along the walkway have grammatical errors and misspelled words. These signs should be inspected and corrected.
- 50. Overall the plan is thoughtful and carefully stitched together with the site's key attributes. The strength is the idea of creating a loop that links the 4 essential park spaces (beach park, Scottsdale greenway, Papago park and the east riparian area) together. To make stronger, this loop should be connected to the private developments in a way that engages and promotes an urban edge. As the developments adjacent to the new loop manifest in the coming years, the city would benefit from some overlay zoning that established criteria for reinforcing the urban spatial relationships and promote mutually beneficial uses. Regarding the rio-loop park specifically, if believe the design team should add in one or two audacious or outrageous nodes or points of opportunity. Who knows what they could become maybe an island with restaurants or a giant ferris wheel. Maybe a floating barge that could be ticketed and moved by tug boat during the 4th of July celebrations. This would a place holder for an opportunity. Dream big everyone Tempe deserves it.
- 51. You are not going to get the online involvement that you seek. there are security blocks and warnings to display the plan, and survey. People will be afraid to release the security on this page, even if its City of Tempe.

- 52. I am an active member of the Arizona Dragon Boat Association (AZDBA). The AZDBA and outrigger clubs currently store club boats and equipment in a secure area in the parking lot east of the marina, and use the large boat ramp to launch and land boats. The Masterplan proposes a parking structure on that site. Where are the boats supposed to go if the parking structure is built? Is the proposed new boat house large enough to house the dragon boats and outriggers? The large boat ramp appears to be missing. Will a comparable dock or ramp be built to accommodate the dragon boats and outrigger canoes? These boats are too large and heavy to be carried to side docks, as can be done with rowing sculls. The proposed "improvements" to the marina area do not appear to support dragon boating and outrigger teams. The AZDBA is more than just a local paddling group. We are a member of the Pacific Coast Dragon Boat Assoc., which is member of the United States Dragon Boat Federation - and which in turn is a member of the International Dragon Boat Federation. Arizona dragon boat teams train here to earn berths in international competitions, proudly representing our state and our nation. The AZDBA also includes a Breast Cancer Survivor team (my team!) and Team Blue, an adapted athlete team comprised of United States military veterans. Our BCS team will represent Arizona and the United States at the International Breast Cancer Paddling Commission Dragon Boat Festival in Florence, Italy this summer. That honor and opportunity would not be possible without the access to the lake, facilities and equipment that we currently have. Please continue to support the AZDBA as you move forward with the Rio Salado Masterplan.
- 53. It's great that a swimming area is being set up on the north side, but you need something water related on the south side, which is the populous side. Bring back the splash park. We have lots of tourists and families and there should be a way to cool off.
- 54. More bathrooms and need a dog park and there is no playground for the kids. Where are the benches and tables?
- 55. What is the green section in the canal bed to the West? There are ample parks with non-native flora in Tempe- we do not need a new large grass area to water and maintain.
- 56. Looks good
- 57. This is not just an area park to us...this is our front yard. We want to make sure green space next to TCA is maintained and not littered with additional benches, hardscape, etc. Things like public art or playground would be good. Better signage/entry to park area would be good, but not to deficit of the landscaping currently along Rio Salado next to TCA. As a rowing family, we want to make sure the lake is kept clear for the amount of boating traffic there already is -- piers/docks sticking into the lake just make it narrower.
- 58. Attended the 5/9 session at the arts center. Like my neighbor, the first commenter, I was disturbed by the lack of mention of the residents along the lake. We were regularly lumped in with the "corporate district", but we're very much (Edgewater, Bridgeview, SALT) a residential neighborhood, needing the respect of peace and quiet and appropriate uses. I had no specific alarms from the proposal and by and large things go very well now, but it seemed odd that a presentation so polished dropped a clanger on this issue.

59. Check out the Sea Organ by Nikola Basic in Zara Croatia... wonderful public art/ public gathering space. Arts can activate the waterfront and be a destination. There is also a great solar LED play pad at that site. Might be a good way to find public private partnership with First Solar right here in TEMPE. Could be a great NODE.



2. How often do you visit Tempe Town Lake for recreation?



#### 3. How often do you visit Tempe Town Lake for events?





4. How often do you visit Tempe Town Lake for work?





5. Should small retail shops be allowed in the park?









# 12. Please share any other comments you have related to the Rio Salado + Tempe Beach Park Masterplan.

- 1. Please do NOT build docks or stages out into the lake because they would be a hazard to rowers, dragonboats, kayaks. The lake is often crowded with boats, rowing teams, and rowing classes. There should be no new obstructions in the lake.
- 2. East end dead zone. Improve east connection around lake. Ground too flat, create community hill. Linear parks, make strips for recreation. Improve people access to water such as small stream 2 to 3 feet wide.
- 3. As a lakeside resident, traffic is already a nightmare. Something must be done to move traffic. I walk my dog at night. The city needs to resolve the large homeless population that takes over the lake at night.
- 4. Big future. I'm concerned that the park, open space aspects are being overtaken by the economic development aspects. Already, there's a wall of suburban, quality steal and glass cutting off the community, our main campus, our other major open space elements like Hayden Butte Preserve and our neighborhoods from our primary reason for being character defining open space. Connections are an afterthought and unless we establish the standards now, the future of the Rio Salado will just bring more of the same Mesa influx.
