Agave care for bare root plants:

- 1. Bare root agave already have callused roots. Soak them in plain water over night to get them ready for planting.
- 2. Plant your agave in a partial to fun sun location.
- When you first plant your new agave consider utilizing shade cloth or something similar to protect it from the harsh sun while acclimating to its new environment.
- 4. Provide shade cloth if it shows signs of stress from the sun. Examples include white or pale patches on leaves, black or crispy leaf edges.
- 5. Use native soil that your agave is adapted to rather than amending the soil. Whatever you dig out can be used to backfill.
- 6. Time to establish those roots! Refer to the Landscape Watering by the Numbers guide provided at Tempe.gov/conservation for a watering schedule designed for newly planted desert plants.

Agave care, from pot:

- 1. Ease the agave out of the pot without pulling on the plant itself. Consider cutting the pot open for safest removal.
- 2. Plant your agave in a partial to full sun location.
- 3. When you first plant your new agave consider utilizing shade cloth or something similar to protect it from the harsh sun while acclimating to its new environment.
- 4. Provide shade cloth if it shows signs of stress from the sun. Examples include white or pale patches on leaves, black or crispy leaf edges.
- 5. Use native soil that your agave is adapted to rather than amending the soil. Whatever you dig out can be used to backfill.
- 6. Allow your agave to adjust to its new home before watering it, to allow roots damaged during transplant to heal and callus. Water it after 5 7 days.
- 7. Time to establish those roots! Refer to the Landscape Watering by the Numbers guide provided at Tempe.gov/conservation for a watering schedule designed for newly planted desert plants.
