Federal Reconciliation Bill, Assistance to Cities

Via Ballard Spahr, 2/10/21

The House Committee on Oversight and Reform is scheduled to consider legislation on Friday that provides direct assistance to states and local governments for costs associated with the pandemic, including revenue replacement. Once it is approved by the committee, the language will be incorporated into the larger budget reconciliation bill that will be considered by the House in the next few weeks.

The committee estimates that the City of Tempe will receive \$42.5 million under the proposal.

House Committee Release, State and Local Relief

The House Oversight Committee language of the Reconciliation bill moving through Congress currently includes money for state and local relief. NLC is supportive of the language and will work to ensure passage. NLC statement to come.

Memos for House Committee on Financial Services (rental/utility/home security assistance) and House Oversight and Reform Committee for state/local emergency relief are attached. The mark up for oversight will be on Friday.

Here's state and local relief news:

House Oversight and Reform Committee Provides Topline Reconciliation Provisions for State and Local Governments

Today, the House Oversight and Reform Committee provided new details on the state and local government aid section under the COVID-19 emergency aid reconciliation package. **The state and local section meets NLC's top legislative priority of delivering federal emergency aid to every city, town, and village - there is no minimum population requirement. This is a first!** Provisions communicated to NLC appear below.

Main points for cities, towns, and villages:

- \$350 billion in total for all municipalities, counties, states, tribes, and territories. Of that amount,
- \$130 billion is set-aside for local governments, equally divided between municipalities and counties.
- The \$65 billion for municipalities will be allocated to all 19,000 cities, towns, and villages according to a modified Community Development Block Grant formula. Under that formula:
 - \$45.5 billion will be split among all municipalities that are designated CDBG entitlement cities (generally cities with populations above 50,000)
 - \$19.5 billion will be split among cities not designated CDBG entitlement cities (generally cities with populations below 50,000 residents)

Of the remaining funds:

- \$195 billion for states and the District of Columbia
- \$65 billion for counties
- \$20 billion for tribes
- \$4.5 billion for territories

Additional details

- No deadline for spending down funds
- Eligible expenditures will include replacement of lost revenue
- The U.S. Treasury Department will allocate funds in similar fashion to CDBG.
 - Funding for CDBG entitlement cities (generally above 50,000 pop.) will be determined by the CDBG formula.
 - Funding for non-entitlement cities (generally below 50,000 pop.) will be allocated based on population

Next Steps

- The Oversight and Reform Committee will vote on the state and local aid section, including amendments, this Friday starting at 12:00 noon. Following passage, the section will be delivered to the House Budget Committee to be assembled into the broader emergency aid package.
- Other sections that are likely to get Committee votes this Friday include the transportation assistance section and the housing assistance section, both of which have NLC's support.

CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND AUGMENTED – “CRITICAL AID”: \$350B total (see above)

EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE:

- Homeowners and renters would receive another \$29 billion in assistance, including for utility payments, under legislation to be considered by the House Committee on Financial Services on Wednesday [at this link](#).
- The bill would expand on the \$25 billion renter assistance program enacted in last year's the Consolidated Appropriations Act.
- Bill Section 4201 would provide \$19.05 billion in funding to the Department of Treasury for emergency rental and utility assistance that would be allocated to states, territories, counties, and cities to help stabilize renters during the coronavirus pandemic, and help rental property owners of all sizes continue to cover their costs.
- Additionally section 4207 would provide \$9.961 billion to states, territories, and tribes to address the ongoing needs of homeowners struggling to afford their housing due directly or indirectly to the impacts of the coronavirus pandemic by providing direct assistance with **mortgage payments, property taxes, property insurance, utilities, and other housing related costs**.

EDUCATION STABILIZATION FUND:

- [Provides \\$128.5B for grants to State educational agencies \(SEA\)](#), with 90 percent allocated to local educational agencies (LEA), to be made in accordance with the same terms and conditions applicable to funds provided in fiscal year 2021 for the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSERF) of the Education Stabilization Fund.
- Under section 1117 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, LEAs are required to provide equitable services based on the number of low-income students, residing in eligible attendance areas within the district, who attend private schools.
- Provides \$39.5B for grants to institutions of higher education to be made in accordance with same terms and conditions applicable to funds provided in fiscal year 2021 for Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) of the Education Stabilization Fund.

HOUSE COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE:

- FEMA's Disaster Relief Fund: \$50 billion for reimbursement to state, local, tribal, and territorial governments dealing with ongoing response and recovery activities from COVID-19, including vaccination efforts, deployment of the National Guard, providing personal protective equipment for critical public sector employees, and disinfecting activities in public facilities such as schools and courthouses.
- Transit: \$30 billion to help assist with operating costs, including payroll and personal protective equipment.
- Airports: \$8 billion, including \$800 million for airport concessionaires.
- Economic Development Administration: \$3 billion to provide economic adjustment assistance to help prevent, prepare for, and respond to economic injury caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Aerospace manufacturing: \$3 billion for a temporary payroll support program to retain or rehire workers.

State Legislative Update

Today is the 33rd day of the 2021 state legislative session. As of today, 1,707 bills have been posted, which is hundreds more than in typical sessions and is more than any previous session. They are 29 bills that have passed this session. The next bill deadline is 2/19/21, which is the last day for Senate consideration of Senate bills and House consideration of House bills.

The bills of interest to Tempe will be added to lists (described below). Bills of significant interest will be highlighted in future memo summaries as the session progresses and bills gain momentum in the legislative process.

Bill Lists

The bills of interest to Tempe will both be added to the lists and be fine-tuned in the coming months as more information is available and as bills continue to be introduced and other bills die when they fail to meet deadlines for scheduling or passage.

Staff is analyzing legislative proposals as they become available. As we continue into session, we will have a better understanding of which bills will be heard and move through committees and which bills should be tracked but do not require the same level of attention. The lists will be adjusted to reflect current information.

The tracking list (List 1) that follows this memo includes the summaries of bills that may be of interest to Tempe. This list will be fine-tuned as staff is able to review bills in depth and as proposals are amended. As more analysis is done, additional comments and/or bill tracking lists may be included. These lists are not exhaustive, and we are continuing to update as bills are introduced. Readers can use the search/find tool (keyboard shortcut: press "Ctrl" and the "F" key) to search for terms of interest, like fireworks, rentals, zoning, etc.

AZ Department of Health Services COVID-19 Update

Department of Health Services (Department) COVID-19 updates:

- This week, Arizona hit a major milestone with [over 1,000,000 doses of vaccine administered](#) in the state! As of today, over 10,045,000 doses of vaccine have been administered in Arizona with over 811,000 Arizonans receiving first doses of vaccine and nearly 225,000 having a complete series.
- On Tuesday, ADHS launched a new section of our [data dashboard](#) to provide additional details about vaccine administration. More information about the section is available in [Dr. Christ's blog](#). The dashboard allows you to filter by county and by the state vaccination sites to see number of doses ordered and administered, and provides demographic breakdowns for age, sex, and race/ethnicity. Of note, due to the phased approach of vaccine distribution, the demographics presented here are not yet expected to align with general population demographics.
- ADHS continues to work with partners to operate high throughput state vaccination sites that serve as a national model:
 - On Monday, Dr. Christ had the honor of taking President Biden and Vice President Harris on a virtual tour of State Farm Stadium. This visit highlighted the incredible success of this site as a national model of a high throughput vaccination site.
 - Over 215,000 doses of COVID-19 vaccine have been administered at the 2 existing state vaccination sites - State Farm Stadium and Phoenix Municipal Stadium
 - This week, Governor Ducey [announced](#) that the State, in partnership with University of Arizona and Pima County will open the first state vaccination site in Southern Arizona. This site will expand current capacity and hours of operation at the existing University of Arizona vaccination site. This transition will begin on February 18th, with registration for new appointments at the site opening on February 16 at 9 AM at [podvaccine.azdhs.gov](#).
- A list and map of vaccination sites throughout Arizona with contact and registration information is available at [azhealth.gov/findvaccine](#) and is routinely updated as new vaccination sites are added.
 - Recent additions to the map will include the 284 retail pharmacy sites currently receiving a direct vaccine allocation from the federal government to serve Arizonans 65 and older as well as others in the [phase 1A and priority phase 1B categories](#). Federal partners have informed us that these sites have received an initial allocation of 21,000 doses with more to follow in future weeks.
- Each week, based Arizona receives notification from the federal government about the number of doses available to order for the upcoming week. This week, 176,600 doses were allocated to the state for delivery the week of 2/14.

- ADHS continues to monitor COVID-19 data and we are encouraged by some of the downward trends:
 - After reaching a peak in cases with over 65,000 cases reported the week of Jan. 3, cases have decreased in Arizona for four consecutive weeks. Fewer than 20,000 cases were reported the week of Jan. 31.
 - Percent positivity is still elevated at 12% for the week of Jan. 24, but it has decreased for the last four weeks.

- The number of people hospitalized with COVID-19 has been decreasing over the last four weeks.
- All 15 counties are in the substantial transmission category with all benchmarks (case rates, percent positivity, and hospitalization due to COVID-Like Illness) in the substantial range.

Re: Committee Business Meeting

On **Friday, February 12, 2021, at 12:00 p.m. ET, in room 2154 of the Rayburn House Office Building and over WebEx**, the Committee will hold a business meeting to consider a Committee Print to implement the instructions provided by S. Con. Res. 5, the Concurrent Resolution on the Budget for Fiscal Year 2021. The Committee Print contains:

1. Critical Aid to States, Local Governments, Tribes, and Territories
2. Emergency Paid Leave for Civilian Federal Employees
3. Oversight and Accountability Provisions

The Committee will also consider several Postal naming measures.

I. CRITICAL AID TO STATES, LOCAL GOVERNMENTS, TRIBES, AND TERRITORIES

The Committee Print would create new State and Local Coronavirus Relief Funds to help mitigate the effects of COVID-19 and its negative economic impacts. Sixty percent of the funds would go to States and 40% to localities. Local governments of every size would receive dedicated allotments. Funds would be available until expended and would be awarded directly from the Department of the Treasury within 60 days of enactment. Funds for local governments serving less than 50,000 inhabitants would be transferred from Treasury to states for distribution within thirty days of receipt.

II. EMERGENCY PAID LEAVE FOR CIVILIAN FEDERAL EMPLOYEES

The bill would provide emergency paid leave for civilian federal employees and postal workers. Employees would be eligible for up to 600 hours of leave when forced to quarantine or

ill with COVID-19, when caring for a child whose school or place of care has been closed or conducting virtual learning, or when caring for a family member who is incapable of self-care whose care provider is unavailable due to COVID-19. Leave would be available until September 30, 2021, and employees would be required to first use any other paid sick leave when applicable.

III. OVERSIGHT AND ACCOUNTABILITY PROVISIONS

The Committee Print would provide additional funds to oversight entities to promote transparency and support oversight of coronavirus relief funds. The Government Accountability Office would receive \$77 million in funding, and the Pandemic Response Accountability Committee, which consists of Inspectors General and operates under the auspices of the Committee of Inspectors General for Integrity and Efficiency, would receive \$40 million.

The full Committee will convene to mark up the following measure at 12:00 pm on Wednesday, February 10, 2021, and subsequent days if necessary, in a hybrid format in room 2128 of the Rayburn House Office Building as well as on the WebEx platform. This measure will be marked up pursuant to the reconciliation instructions contained within S.Con.Res.5, the Concurrent Resolution on the Budget for Fiscal Year 2021 (“Budget Resolution”). The Budget Resolution instructs the Committee on Financial Services to “submit changes in laws within its jurisdiction to increase the deficit by not more than \$75,000,000,000 for the period of fiscal years 2021 through 2030.” The Committee will mark up an Amendment in the Nature of a Substitute (ANS), which makes technical changes to the base text.

Overview

As of February 4, 2021, the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic has caused more than 104 million infections and over 2.2 million deaths worldwide, with more than 26 million infections and 443,000 deaths in the United States alone.¹ The daily mortality rates for COVID-19 since mid-November 2020 make it the leading cause of death in the United States.² The COVID-19 pandemic has disproportionately affected low-income communities and people of color. For example, in substantially non-white counties that have a high rate of poverty, residents have a nine times greater chance of death from COVID-19 than in mostly white, similar-income counties.³ COVID-19 has also taken a substantial economic toll. The national unemployment rate peaked at 14.7% in April 2020 when 20.5 million people in the United States lost their jobs.⁴ The unemployment rate in the United States remains at 6.7%, significantly higher than the 3.5% pre-pandemic unemployment rate.⁵ Real gross domestic product (GDP) for the third quarter of 2020 is 3.4% below the level of real GDP for the fourth quarter of 2019, the most recent quarter before the onset of the pandemic.⁶

On January 14, 2021, then-President-elect Joseph R. Biden announced the American Rescue Plan (the Plan), a \$1.9 trillion legislative proposal to address the health and economic impacts of the COVID-

19 pandemic.⁷ The Plan would provide relief to individuals, communities, and businesses, stimulate the economy, invest in health measures such as vaccination infrastructure, and provide \$9 billion to invest in cybersecurity infrastructure.⁸ According to one estimate, in contrast to no additional fiscal support, the Plan would increase real GDP by roughly 4 percent at the end of 2021 and 2 percent at the end of 2022.⁹

The Budget Resolution provides instructions to the following 12 House Committees: Agriculture, Education and Labor, Energy and Commerce, Financial Services, Foreign Affairs, Natural Resources, Oversight and Reform, Science, Space and Technology, Small Business, Transportation and Infrastructure, Veterans Affairs, and Ways and Means. Each House Committee has been instructed in accordance with their jurisdiction to report legislation totaling in aggregate \$1.9 trillion consistent with specified budgetary target amounts no later than February 16, 2020. In addition to the Committee on Financial Services, reconciliation instructions were provided to the following Committees to submit changes in laws within their respective jurisdictions to increase the deficit by not more than the following amounts for the period of fiscal years 2021 through 2030:

- Committee on Agriculture - \$16,112,000,000
- Committee on Education and Labor - \$357,076,000,000
- Committee on Energy and Commerce - \$188,498,000,000
- Committee on Foreign Affairs - \$10,000,000,000
- Committee on Natural Resources - \$1,005,000,000
- Committee on Oversight and Reform - \$350,690,000,000
- Committee on Science, Space and Technology - \$750,000,000
- Committee on Small Business - \$50,000,000,000
- Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure - \$95,620,000,000
- Committee on Veterans' Affairs - \$17,000,000,000
- Committee on Ways and Means - \$940,718,000,000

Upon the conclusion of the markup, each Committee will report its recommendations to the House Committee on Budget. The Budget Committee will then combine all committees' recommendations and report them to the floor as a single budget reconciliation measure.

Financial Services Committee Instructions.

The Budget Resolution instructs the Committee on Financial Services to “submit changes in laws within its jurisdiction to increase the deficit by not more than \$75,000,000,000 for the period of fiscal years 2021 through 2030.” The Committee Print to be considered at the markup would increase the deficit in the following ways:

\$10 billion for Defense Production Act spending. The United States continues to face shortages of key medical supplies and equipment to combat the COVID-19 Pandemic, demonstrating key gaps in the capacity of domestic manufacturing to fulfill U.S. public health needs. N95 masks are being reused over the objections of essential health workers¹⁰ and critical gaps and vulnerabilities in medical and drug supply chains are complicating efforts to rapidly deploy vaccines, such as a lack of syringes with low dead space needles.¹¹ In addition, the emerging COVID-19 variants and future mutations may require

significant additional changes in production lines or the cooperation of different corporations. The Committee's recommendations on reconciliation includes Sec. 4101, which provides \$10,000,000 to carry out the authorities of the Defense Production Act of 1950 (DPA). The DPA is an authority that allows the President to help increase domestic production of essential materials, including making purchase commitments, buying materials that are hard to acquire for industry, and help private sectors entities expand production lines to fulfill U.S. national security needs. These funds would be available, for example, to help boost domestic production of critical personal protective equipment, secure supply chain and increased capacity for vital vaccine production, and help onshore production of rapid COVID-19 tests.

\$25 billion for Emergency Rental Assistance. The economic impact of the coronavirus pandemic has taken a heavy toll on renters. More than 50% of renters lost income in the early part of the pandemic, and renters—particularly Black and Latinx renters—have been more likely to lose employment than homeowners.¹² According to the U.S. Census Bureau's Household Pulse Survey, 19% of renter households reported that they were not caught up on rent in December of 2020, with Black and Latinx renters more likely to be behind than White renters.¹³ While Congress provided \$25 billion in emergency rent and utility assistance in December 2020, Moody's Analytics¹⁴ unpaid rent, utilities, and additional fees.¹⁵ Prior to imposition of the CDC eviction moratorium order, researchers predicted that between 29 and 40 million renters could be evicted by the end of 2020 due to financial instability.¹⁶ While the CDC order has helped some families remain in their homes, it is only a half-solution, as people will still owe any back-rent they have accrued. The reconciliation package includes \$25 billion to provide assistance to renters, including assistance targeted to specific populations to ensure vulnerable families in all communities are able to access the relief they need.

- Section 4201. This section would provide \$19.05 billion in funding to the Department of Treasury for emergency rental and utility assistance that would be allocated to states, territories, counties, and cities to help stabilize renters during the coronavirus pandemic, and help rental property owners of all sizes continue to cover their costs.
- Section 4202. This section would provide \$5 billion for emergency Housing Choice Vouchers to transition people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, survivors of domestic violence, and victims of human trafficking to stable housing.
- Section 4203. This section would provide \$100 million to support unassisted households living in USDA-subsidized properties and who are struggling to pay rent during the coronavirus pandemic.
- Section 4204. This section would provide \$750 million to support the Indian Housing Block Grant program and the Indian Community Development Block Grant program to help Alaska Natives, Native Americans, and Native Hawaiians respond to pressing housing needs during the coronavirus pandemic.
- Section 4205. This section would authorize \$100 million in funding for NeighborWorks to support housing counseling services that help renters, people experiencing homelessness, people at risk of homelessness, and homeowners navigate their housing options and rights, including protections and resources provided through coronavirus relief legislation.

\$5 billion for Homelessness Funding. Even before the coronavirus pandemic, homelessness had reached crisis proportions in some parts of the country and more than a half a million people were already living in shelters, on streets, or other places not fit for human habitation. People experiencing homelessness are particularly vulnerable to the coronavirus because they are disproportionately likely to have underlying health conditions, and because they often do not have the means to follow CDC guidance around hand washing and social distancing, particularly because most emergency shelters provide congregate living facilities. People experiencing homelessness who contract the coronavirus¹⁶ While the CARES Act provided \$4 billion in homeless assistance, experts estimate that at least \$5 billion in additional assistance is needed to help communities provide shelter that facilitates social distancing and supportive services. The Committee's recommendations on reconciliation include section 4206, which to enable state and local governments to finance supportive services, affordable housing, and the acquisition of non-congregate shelter (such as hotels), for the hundreds of thousands of people currently experiencing homelessness. Funding would be distributed through the HOME program formula.

Homeowner Assistance Funding. As mortgage interest rates hit historic lows and house prices continue to climb during COVID, national delinquency rates in May of 2020 reached the highest peak since August of 2014¹⁷ According to the latest Census Bureau Pulse Survey data, over 8 million homeowners reported to be behind on their mortgage payments.¹⁸ Homeowners of color are nearly three times as likely to be behind compared to their W¹⁹²⁰²¹ While CARES Act forbearances have provided temporary reprieve for many homeowners with federally-backed mortgages, some of the most vulnerable borrowers, especially those with non-federally-backed loans, have been unable to access mortgage relief and continue to struggle to make housing payments during the pandemic.

- **Section 4207.** This section would provide \$9.961 billion to states, territories, and tribes to address the ongoing needs of homeowners struggling to afford their housing due directly or indirectly to the impacts of the coronavirus pandemic by providing direct assistance with mortgage payments, property taxes, property insurance, utilities, and other housing related costs.
- **Section 4208.** This section would provide \$39 million for the Department of Agriculture (USDA) to continue providing Section 502 and 504 home loans, which help low- and very-low income borrowers purchase, repair, and rehabilitate housing in rural areas, while helping existing USDA borrowers who are struggling to afford their housing during the COVID-19 pandemic.

\$10 billion for the State Small Business Credit Initiative. As the economy recovered from the 2008 financial crisis and Great Recession,²² States used the funds to establish or support loan participation programs, venture capital programs, collateral support programs, loan guarantee programs, and capital access programs.²³ During the pandemic²³ COVID-19²⁴ In particular, Black and other

minority-owned businesses face severe distress, and have struggled to obtain access to the Paycheck Protection Program and other small business relief measures.²⁵

- Subtitle C, Section 4301. The Committee Print would provide \$10 billion through a reauthorized SSBCI program to support up to \$100 billion in small business financing through state, territorial, and tribal government programs. This amount includes up to \$2.5 billion to support business enterprises owned and controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged individuals, including minority-owned businesses. The Committee Print would provide \$500 million for tribal government programs, and \$500 million to provide technical assistance to small businesses that need legal, accounting, financial and other kinds of advice in applying for small business support programs. Among other things, this bill would also require states and other jurisdictions to submit a plan on how it would expeditiously deliver funds to help small businesses respond to and recover from the pandemic, and a plan to encourage participation of minority depository institutions (MDIs) and community development financial institutions (CDFIs) in the program.

\$15 billion to Support Workers in the Airline Industry. The CARES Act, signed into law on March 27, 2020, established the Payroll Support Program (PSP), which provided \$32 billion in payroll support for workers employed by airlines, cargo air carriers, and contractors servicing air carriers at airports. The PSP expired on September 30, 2020, and had supported over \$28 billion in payroll support at the time of its expiration.²⁶ Through the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021, Congress approved the Payroll Support Program Extension (PSP2), which provided short-term relief to the same class of workers as PSP.²⁷ Airlines that accept PSP2 assistance cannot lay off workers until March 31, 2021.²⁸ According to some estimates, major U.S. airlines lost over \$35 billion in 2020, and although demand for air travel has increased in recent months, airlines do not expect to return to profitability until midway through 2021.²⁹ One airline executive warned that December’s “recall [of workers] will be temporary,” suggesting that airlines will proceed with layoffs if PSP2 is not extended.³⁰

- Subtitle D, Section 4401. The Committee Print would provide \$15 billion to further extend the Payroll Support Program (PSP3) through September 30, 2021, to provide payroll support for airline workers and related contract workers. Specifically, PSP3 would provide \$14 billion to support workers of eligible air carriers, and \$1 billion would be available to support workers of eligible contractors.^{31 32 33}

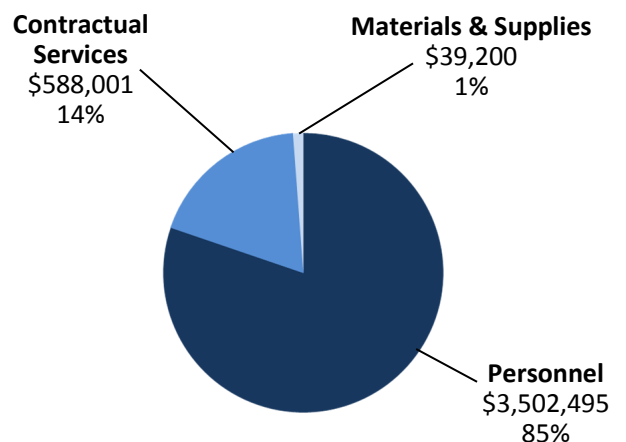

City Sales Taxes are generated by a 1.8% levy on sales transactions in the city. Of the total 1.8% rate, 1.2% is deposited in the General Fund, 0.5% is dedicated for Transit purposes, and the remaining 0.1% is deposited in the Arts & Cultural Fund. The amount deposited in the General Fund is depicted in the table and graph above. This revenue source contributes 47.2% of the General Fund budget in FY 2020-21 making it the City's largest revenue source. Through the first quarter of FY 2020-21, Sales Tax collections are 18.4% of budget, which is above the historical average of 16.1%. In terms of budget-to-actual variance, collections are 2.3% above the budgeted value.

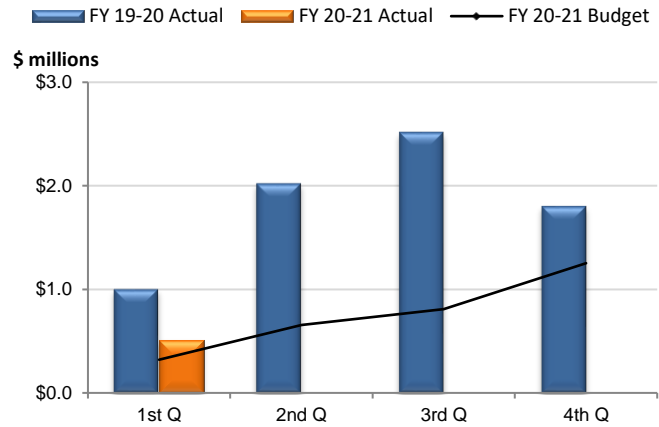

Property Tax revenue in the General Fund is generated by a \$0.89 charge per \$100 of the primary assessed valuation of real and personal property. In FY 2020-21, Property Tax contributes 8.9% of budgeted General Fund revenue. 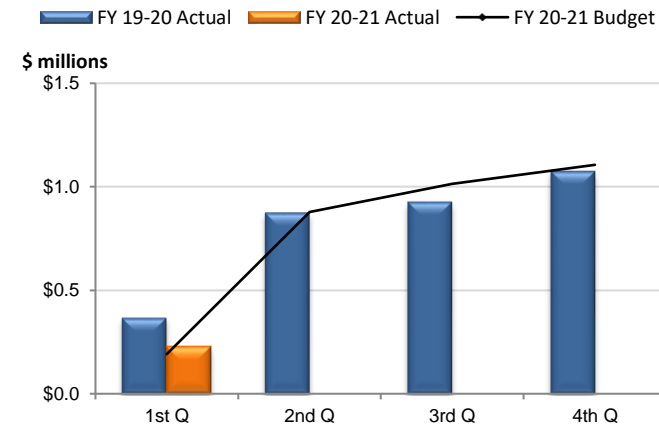

The Transient Lodging Tax, or Bed Tax, is a 5.0% levy on hotel and motel sales that contributes approximately 1.4% of budgeted General Fund revenue in FY 2020-21. This revenue category normally contributes approximately 3% to 4% of budgeted General Fund revenue, however, the budgeted amount for FY 2020-21 reflects the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on transient lodging revenues. Bed Tax collections through the first quarter of FY 2020-21 are 16.6% of budget, which is higher than the historical average of 10.5%. In terms of budget-to-actual variance, collections are \$185 thousand above the budgeted value.

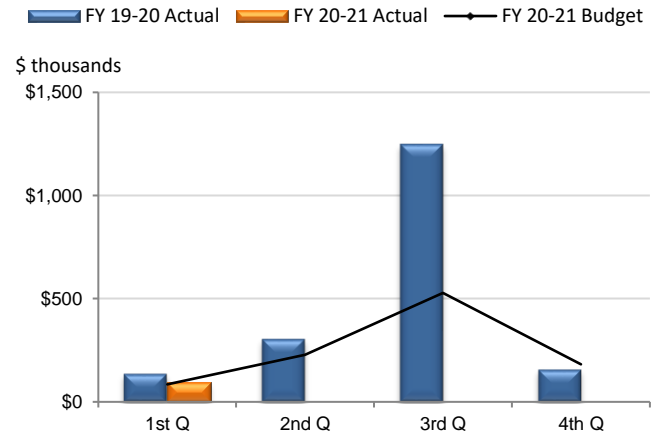

Franchise Fee revenues are collected based on specific agreements with service providers in the city, including Arizona Public Service (2.0% of revenue), Cox Communications (5.0% of gross revenue), and Southwest Gas (2.0% of gross revenue). These fees contribute 1.5% of annual General Fund revenue. Franchise Fee payments are 7.2% of the budgeted amount through the first quarter of FY 2020-21, compared to 6.0% historically. In terms of budget-to-actual variance, collections are \$37 thousand above the expected amount.

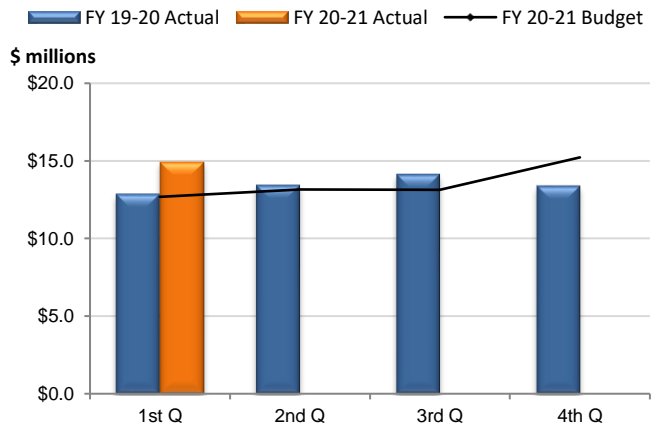

The City requires taxable business activities to be licensed, with the annual licensing fee amount varying by business type. Starting in 2017, the Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) began collecting the fees for Tempe's Sales Tax Licenses. Sales Tax License collections through the first quarter of FY 2020-21 were 9.2% of budget, compared to the historical average of 8.3%. Sales Tax Licenses contribute 0.5% of annual General Fund revenue. In terms of budget-to-actual variance, collections are 0.9% above budget, or \$9 thousand.

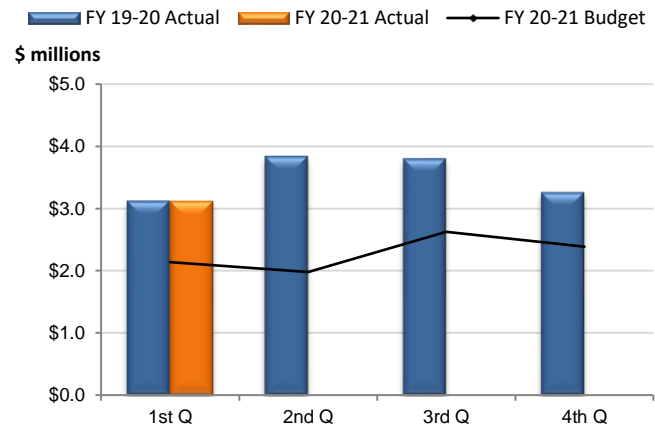

Intergovernmental Revenue includes distributions of State Income Taxes, State Sales Taxes, and State Vehicle License Taxes. These revenues are distributed based on Tempe's share of the state urban population as determined by the U.S. Census. In total, these revenues constitute 25.4% of budgeted revenue for FY 2020-21, making this the second largest General Fund revenue source after Sales Taxes. Through the first quarter of FY 2020-21, actual collections are 27.5% of budget, compared to a historical average of 23.4%. In terms of budget-to-actual variance, collections are 4.1% above budget.

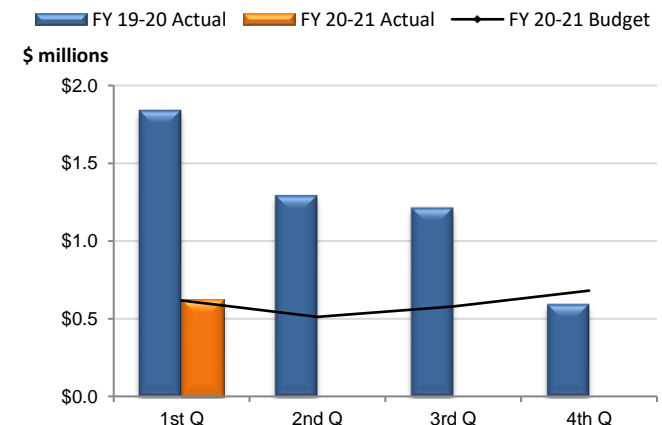

Building and Trade revenues consist of Building Permit Fees, Plan Check Fees, and other miscellaneous engineering and permitting fees generated by development. These fees are charged to recover a portion of the cost of regulating development. In FY 2020-21, this revenue source contributes 4.3% of budgeted General Fund revenue. Through the first quarter of FY 2020-21, actual collections are 34.2% of budget, compared to a historical average of 23.4%. Thus far, in terms of budget-to-actual variance, collections are 10.8% above the budgeted estimate. This is due to the level of development activity that has continued to outperform revenue estimates.

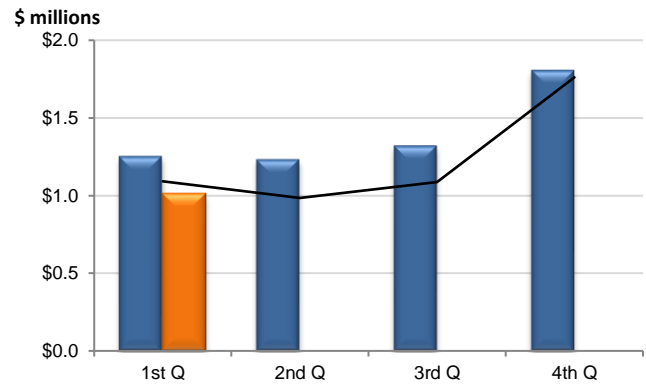
Cultural and Recreational revenues include fees and charges to recover a portion of the costs of providing the City's cultural and recreational programs. The majority of this revenue source is generated from fees charged for the City's Kid Zone program. In total, Cultural and Recreational fees represent 1.1% of total budgeted General Fund revenue for FY 2020-21. This revenue category normally represents 3% of the total budgeted General Fund revenue, however the FY 2020-21 revenue amount was adjusted to reflect impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on structured recreational classes and limited cultural activities. Through the first quarter of FY 2020-21, Cultural and Recreational fee collections are 26.1% of budget, compared to the historical average of 25.8%, for a total positive variance of 0.3%. In terms of budget-to-actual variance, collections are \$6 thousand above the budgeted estimate.

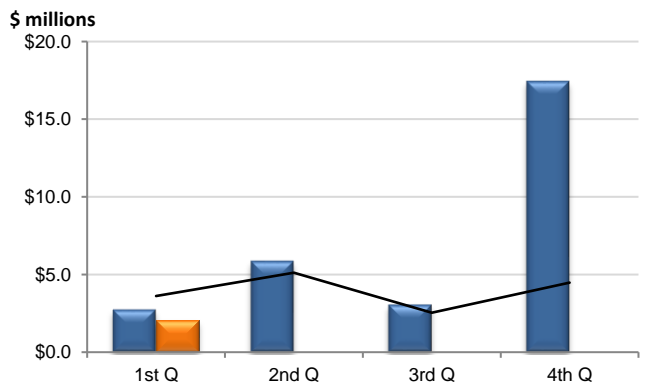
Fines, Fees, and Forfeiture revenue derives from fines and other payments related to violations of state laws and local ordinances, including parking, traffic, and criminal enforcement activities. In total, Fines, Fees, and Forfeitures represent 2.3% of total budgeted General Fund revenue for FY 2020-21. Through the first quarter of FY 2020-21, 20.6% of budgeted revenues have been collected, compared to a historical average of 22.2%. In terms of budget-to-actual variance, this category is 1.6% below the expected value through the first quarter.

Other Revenues include collections from a variety of sources not otherwise accounted for in the major revenue categories. Primary components of Other Revenues are Land Sales, Interest Earnings, Land and Building Facility Rental, and SRP In-Lieu Payments. In FY 2020-21, this revenue source contributes 7.4% of budgeted General Fund revenue. Through the first quarter of the fiscal year, collections of Other Revenue are 13.1% of the FY 2020-21 budget, compared to a historical tracking percentage of 23%. The variance appears to be due primarily to the timing of receipt of payments and that this negative variance will be resolved as the fiscal year progresses.

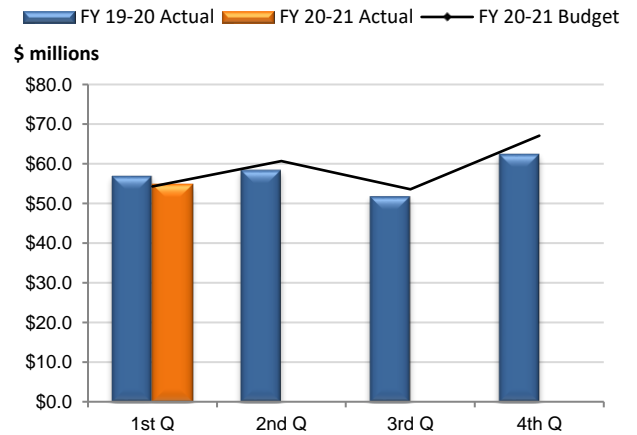

The Transit Fund accounts for the receipt of the Mass Transit Tax, a 0.5% tax on sales. Fund resources are dedicated to transit system planning, design, and operations, community outreach, and debt service. Through the end of the first quarter, there is an operating deficit in the Transit Fund of \$4.3 million. Transit Fund revenue is at 13.0% of budget which is lower than the historical tracking percentage of 14.6. Expenditures are 16.7% of budget while the historical tracking percentage is 16.1%. Total expenses through the first quarter are 17.4% of budget compared to the historical average of 17.4%. Through the first quarter, the fund has an operating surplus of \$261 thousand.

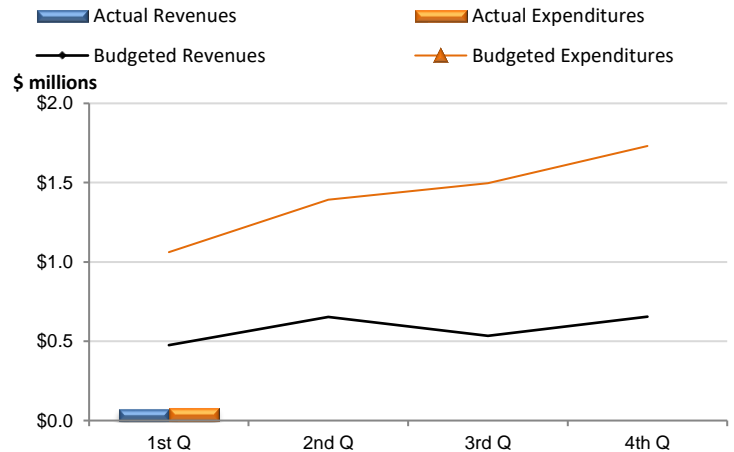

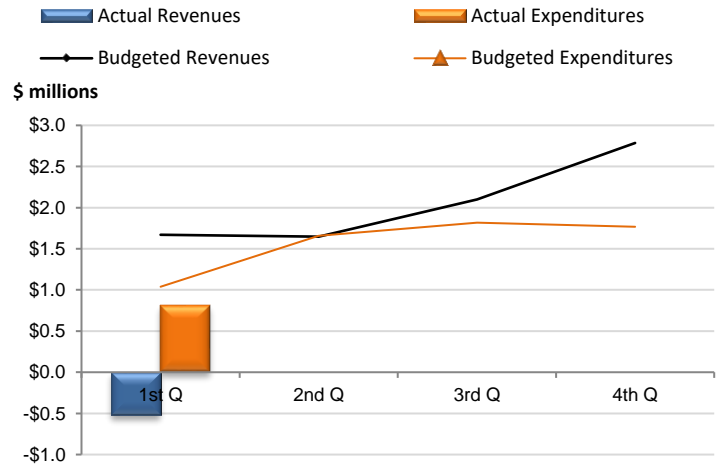

Revenues through the first quarter total -6.3% of the FY 2020-21 budget, compared to the historical percentage of 20.4%. Expenditures through the first quarter total 13.0% of the FY 2020-21 budget, compared to the historical percentage of 16.5%. The net result on the fund's status through the first quarter is an operating deficit of \$1.3 million. The negative revenue is due largely to receivable grant revenue for funds expended in the prior fiscal year pending receipt of funds to reimburse these expenses. The Police Department will be monitoring revenue and expenditures during the remainder of the fiscal year and will address variances from budget.

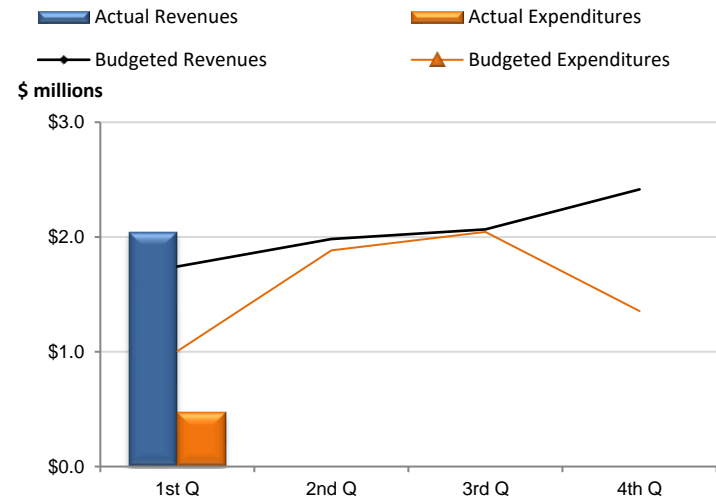

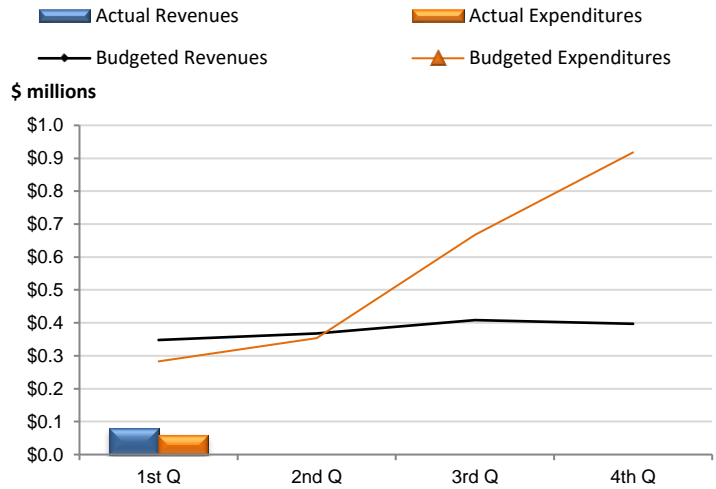

The Court Enhancement Fund is established to account for fine, fee and forfeiture revenues dedicated for City Court purposes pursuant to state statute and city code. Revenues through the first quarter total 5.3% of the FY 2020-21 budget, compared to the historical percentage of 22.9%. Expenditures through the first quarter total 2.7% of the FY 2020-21 budget, compared to the historical percentage of 12.7%. This results in a slight surplus of \$22 thousand. The revenue and expense variances from historical trends is due primarily to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on court activity which has resulted in lower than normal fee collections. The City Court will monitor revenue collections to ensure that expenditures in this fund do not exceed available revenue.
